JESUS MISSION – THE MOVIE

Leader Guide

THEME:

The Mandate of the “Everyday Missionary”

Biblical Foundation

“But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.”

Acts 1:8

Study Discussion

- The documentary highlights that many believers wait for a “calling” to the nations, while God often calls us back to our own cities to be missionaries.
- How does the realization that the Great Commission is for the “everyday believer”—not just evangelists—change your personal responsibility in your community?
- Discuss the impact of the founder’s father’s advice: “Stop falling into peer pressure. You need to become the peer pressure”. How can you apply this to your daily environment?

Action Step

Identify one public location you visit weekly (e.g., a coffee shop, gym, or campus) and commit to being present there as a witness for Jesus.

THEME:

Overcoming Fear through Love

Biblical Foundation

“For God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and of love and of a sound mind.”

2 Timothy 1:7

Study Discussion

- The film teaches that we are “seed sowers,” not “soul winners,” meaning our role is to plant while God does the work of saving. How does this perspective alleviate the pressure of fear?
- Rejection is described as “promised” in this mission; how can you mentally prepare for opposition without losing your heart for the people you are reaching?
- The documentary asserts that “evangelism is an overflow of intimacy with God”. If your evangelism feels stagnant, what does that suggest about your current relationship with Jesus?

Action Step

Practice “praying for the least of these” this week. Look for someone in your city who is often overlooked and simply offer a prayer or a blessing.

THEME:

Intergenerational Synergy

Biblical Foundation

“One generation commends your works to another; they tell of your mighty acts.”

Acts 1:8

Study Discussion

- The ministry thrives by combining the “energy and zeal” of the young with the “wisdom, funding, and prayer” of the older generation. How can your group better facilitate this type of collaboration?
- Who has been a “standard-bearer” in your life—someone who modeled what it looks like to live “all-in” for Jesus?
- Discuss how the life and death of Courtney Cordes served as a catalyst for others to “max out for Jesus”. How does seeing others sacrifice inspire your own commitment?

Action Step

Find a partner of a different age bracket in your group and spend time praying for each other’s specific mission field.

THEME:

4 The Power of a “Yes”

Biblical Foundation

“Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit...”

Matthew 28:19–20

Study Discussion

- The documentary concludes that “God honors a yes”. What is a “yes” you have been withholding from God because of comfort or fear?
- The film encourages us to “try and fail” because God is present in our mistakes. Why is it more dangerous to do nothing than to risk an “ugly” attempt at sharing your faith?
- Reflect on the goal of “reaching the one.” How does focusing on one individual at a time make the overwhelming task of the Great Commission feel manageable?

Action Step

Write down one name of a person who needs Jesus. Commit to praying for them by name every day this week and ask God for an opportunity to sow a seed of truth.

Facilitator Notes

Encourage vulnerability. The documentary emphasizes that even seasoned missionaries experience discouragement. By being honest about these feelings, you create a safe space for your group to grow. Focus on multiplication—the goal is creating a culture where one generation commends the works of God to the next.

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
